Derek Sullivan: Bookworks Curated by Emily McKibbon MacLaren Art Centre | Gallery 3 and The Carnegie

This exhibition of drawings by Toronto-based artist Derek Sullivan highlights the unseen architecture of books during their print production. Sculptural installations in two galleries complement the most comprehensive exhibition, to date, of these major drawing works.

This group exhibition, featuring artwork by Therese Bolliger (Toronto, ON), Aidan Cowling (Toronto/Guelph, ON), Yam Lau (Toronto, ON), Max Lupo (Newmarket, ON), Ève K. Tremblay (Montreal, QC/Plattsburgh, NY) and Olivia Whetung (Chemong Lake, ON), looks at artistic strategies to manifest, memorialize or make permanent language or knowledge at risk of being erased.

Arnaud Maggs: Scrapbook Curated by Noor Alé MacLaren Art Centre | Joan Lehman Gallery

Arnaud Maggs (1926-2012) was an award-winning Canadian artist. Scrapbook (2009) from the MacLaren's Collection is a fourpart photographic series depicting page spreads of scrapbooks the artist began in 1975, but never completed. Giving form to memories through accumulated objects, Scrapbook points to the human impulse to collect keepsakes in an effort to deny time's

Lucille Oille: Uninterrupted Eden Curated by Noor Alé MacLaren Art Centre | Molson Community Gallery

Lucille Oille (1912-1997) was a regional artist and illustrator whose works appeared in newspapers and prominent books of the mid-20th century. *Uninterrupted Eden* features a selection of Oille's wood engraving prints of pastoral scenes from two books, In Pastures Green (1915) and The Owl Pen (1947), drawn from the MacLaren's Collection. The works depict the rhythms of the seasons, harvest returns and the rewards of hard labour.
